Oakville's annual autumn fair was popular event for almost 70 years

the fall fair was an annual event in Oakville. At first it was held in the Old Temperance Hall by the Oakville Agricultural Association, formed in 1852 with George K. Chisholm as president and Street. Robert Balmer as secretary.

At first, fairs were held in Oakville near the market building on Navy Street, with cattle and horses being kept in pens on the present site of St. Jude's Church, and tethered along William

The poster advertising the 1868 fair announced that there was over \$600 to be paid out in prizes, ranging from four dollars for livestock, domestic horses and cattle down to manufacturers and fine 25 cents for shell work, horses and cattle down to wax, feather and hair flowers and small fruits.

For many years a feature of the fair was a procession of public school pupils of the town and township.
