Whistles blew, bells rang and people cheered. A rush was made for the school grounds where a prayer and thanksgiving service was held in the open, all rejoicing that the great conflict was over, and giving banks to God. Addresses were given and prayer offered by Capt. Wdcock and Rev. M. E. Sexsmith.
