The elephants of South Africa generally move in herds and ream over vast tracts of forest, which they greatly disfigure, if not dispoil, by pulling down the trees with their trunks, and feeding upon ATRERE you will find nearly every thing the branches, leaves and roots. There are also seine peculiar bulbs of which they are extremely fend; and having discovered the location of these by their exquisite sense of smell, they use their long tusks as plows, and thus turn up

whole acres of ground in quest of them. The elephant is a great feeder, and consumes the most of his time in eating. and sleeping a few hours in the middle of the night, somaimes lying down on bis side, and sometimes standing on his feet. His resorts for gathering his food are generally from fincen to twenty miles from a foundin of water, which, the weather be werm and dry, he visits in the night, dracks his fill, sucks up large quantities of the liquid element to spout over his body, and then returns to the depths of the dark forest. In damp and cloudy weather he only needs to

drink once in two or three days. The elephant is not a clumsy naima as might naturally be supposed from his huge bulk, but moves lightly, and even with grace. Owing to the soft and spongy formation of his feet, his free, easy, swinging step is slimost unnudible; but he has a mode of trumpeting forth his anger, the sound of which fairly sceins to shake the forest around him.
