## JACK STOKES MAKES STATEMENT RE: DEPT. OF TRADE AND DEVELOPMENT

Following is a statement by Jack Stokes, MPP, (New Democrat - Thunder Bay) in connection with second reading of Bill 11, An Act to establish the Department of Trade and Development.

This Bill changes the name of the Dept. of Economics and Development to the Dept. of Trade and Development and extends and clarifies its duties and powers.

It makes no mention of an overall co-ordinated plan which would assist in a meaningful way the areas of northern Ontario which are in such dire need of industrial and resource development.

The Equalization of Industrial Opportunity Program has provided nothing by way of assistance to northern towns and municipalities

When this program was announced last Fall, many areas such as Geraldton, Kenora and Beardmore felt they were in a favour-

able position to attract new industry.

At the latter count 163 Ontario municipalities have qualified. By having to compete for industries looking for a place to locate with areas much closer to markets and the highly developed centres northern towns are right back where they started.

Geraldton went to considerable trouble and expense preparing a comprehensive brief of natural and human resource potential to qualify for equalization entitlements only to find that they are only one of 183 towns that are eligible under this program.

Unless this new department comes up with a plan specifically tailored to meet the needs of northern Ontario towns they will surely die as was the case in Birchall Lake with the closing of North Coldstream Copper Mines.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

The Editor

As the Nipigon factory lies still like an abandoned ship in its sea of melting snow, I am unable to write individual letters to each of the former Nipigon employees in response to the many requests I have received for advice. Publication of the following letter in the Gazette would be a great favor to us all.

To my fellow Nipigon workers before our plant closed on Feb. 2nd, I discussed with many of you the prospects for the reopening of the plant. I promised to get in touch with you as soon as more definite word could be given so that you could be saved the expense of moving you and your family to the site of a new job in another city.

At that time, at most of you were aware, Weldwood were looking into the possibilities of aquiring the plant. Because we realized that the Nipigon plant was more productive than their

Longlac plant, chiefly because of the better and more experienced work force, there seemed a real possibility that something might develop before spring. Last week we heard that Weldwood were not interested. Too bad we had been unable to obtain proper guarantees of timber from the Dept. of Lands and Forests. Other people are still investigating, and Murray Atkinson and I remain hopeful that in the long run the mill can be reopened. However, spring is here and other jobs are opening up. Like many of you I too, am unemployed but my wife and I have concluded that so long as there is something that I can do to help bring a new company into Nipigon, that we should stay. Because of the uncertainty of the future we can no longer ask you to do the same. We all have obligations to our families for food and shelter and clothing which requires money. I can only wish you success in your search and hope that you

will be successful. Please try to forgive the majority of Nipigon people who treat the closing of the mill as some personal injustice, and forgive those who wish to believe that some evil plot by management or the union caused the closing. These

people are afraid, - they fear what they do not understand. For the most part they are women or men who have little experience in business. They don't understand what destroys it. They may be very intelligent, - about cutting up the pie that is already on the table. They have no experience whatever in building anything which creates economic benefit for all the people. When people are afraid they fight back, they kick and scream unreasonably and they blame everyone else but themselves for their fear which is caused by ignorance. This, I believe is what has happened to this vocal minority in Nipigon today. We can only help them to overcome their fear by removing the ignorance, - which is why I am so happy to see that an intelligent committee of citizens has been formed to get the facts and answer whatever questions the citizens might have. I shall co-operate with this group in anyway that is possible. Many of you who are New Canadians may recognize the sickness from earlier days, when you first came to Nipigon and started working at the plant. Many of you learned then what prejudice in a small town like Nipigon can be like. Nipigon received many telephone calls from established Nipigon citizens complaining about the "D.P.'s" that we were hiring instead of a relative of theirs who we had let go because he didn't want to work hard. This was prejudice that was also caused by fear, - the fear that their own particular race or color or creed had no monopoly on ability.

Most of the people of Nipigon are nice people, - after all it is their spirit and enthusiasm which started the plywood mill in the
