BY-LAW NO. 8.

To divide the Township of GLENELG into WARDS.

Be it enacted by the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Glenelg, That the Township of Glenelg be divided into five wards, named as follows:—

DURHAM ward, SOUTH ward, CENTRE ward, WEST ward, and NORTH ward.

DURHAM ward to contain from lots sixteen to thirty inclusive, on the first concession east of the Garafraza Road, and from lots thirty-six to seventy inclusive, on the second and third concessions east of the Garafraza Road, and from lots one to ten inclusive, on the second and third concessions north of the Durham Road, and from lots one to five inclusive on the fourth and fifth concessions north of the Durham Road.

SOUTH ward to contain all the lots on the first, second, third, and fourth concessions south of the Durham Road, and all the lots in the first concession north of the Durham Road.

CENTRE ward to contain the second and third concessions north of the Durham Road from lot ten to the townline of Artemesia, and the fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, and ninth concessions north of the Durham Road, from lot five to the townline of Artemesia.

WEST ward to contain all the lots from number one to fifteen inclusive, on the first concession east of the Garafraza Road, and from number one to number thirty-five inclusive on the second and third concessions east of the Garafraza Road, also from number one to number five inclusive on the sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh, twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth and fifteenth concessions.

NORTH ward to contain all the lots from number five on the tenth, eleventh, twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth, and fifteenth concessions, to the third range west of the Toronto and Sydenham Road, also, the first, second, and third ranges west of the Toronto and Sydenham Road.

And be it further enacted, that this By-law shall come into force and take effect on the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty nine.
