Optim-Eating.

A New York druggist informs us that the consumption of opium in the United States is larger than in any country in the world, except in China.

There is no one poison in habitual use, which is worse than opium. Tobacco, as commonly used, may be more disgusting; ardent spirits give more scandal, and cause more outrages, but opium is the most seductive, demoralizing, and deadly of any except hashish, which has not come into common use.

The legislature of New York passed an act at its last session, requiring that every druggist selling opium, and certain other poisons, should register the name and residence of the purchaser, and label the article poison, under a fine of fifty dollars.

Is it likely that such a law will be obeyed, when opium is bought regularly by thousands of persons, just as they buy brandy or tobacco—bought also by thousands who would not be seen drinking a glass of spirits, while they are in the habit of taking a more destructive poison.

A balloonist states that he has made the following discovery:—

"I take a bar of brass, which, when it was weighed on the earth's surface, actually weighed 15 pounds.
