The procession proceeded to the Victoria Wharves which were built for the "Great Eastern," where the Royal barge was awaiting him, and embarked at 3 15, the military presenting arms, after shaking hands cordially with Lord Lyons, the Mayor, and others. As the Royal barge left the wharf, the British squadron fired a royal salute of 21 guns. Similar salutes were fired from the city and from Fort Preble. The harbor was full of steamers, sail boats, barges, &c., which accompanied the royal barge, and which was surrounded by boats from the Royal squadron Bradley, Thomas filled with British officers.
