

The Presentment of a Murderer.

"I'll tell you what the words were," said he to Mr. Shockley, "for they are to go with me to the grave. You know what I have done, and what is my fate. Put the two together and you can conjecture the nature of the words. Such was the vision that haunted this unfortunate man through his whole manhood. Impressed with the idea that fate had decreed that he must kill his wife and die for the crime, he perpetrated the atrocious deed, and willingly surrendered himself to the gallows.
