The Curculion.

This enemy of the plum can be routed without the old and laborious process of jarring the tree, and gathering the insects on sheets. The following remedy has been several years before the public, and has the recommendation of some of our best pomologists. The writer has used it with success, and now feels as sure of the plum crop as of pears. To one pound of whale oil soap add four ounces flour of sulphur. Mix the mass thoroughly with a spatula or knife, and dissolve in about 3 gallons of water, stirring it well. To one half peck of quinine add four gallons of water, and stir well together. When fully settled, pour off the transparent lime water and add it to the soap mixture. Add to the same, also, say four gallons of tobacco strong tobacco water. Apply this mixture, when thus incorporated, with a garden syringe, to your plum or other fruit trees, so that the foliage will be well drenched. If no rains succeed for three weeks, one application will be sufficient. It should be repeated after rains until the stones are hardened. When the plum is about the size of a pea, it is the best time to apply it, but it is effective upon all plums not yet stung at any season of their growth. This mixture is good for cherries, and all fruits troubled with insects.—American Agriculturist.

Killing Rats—A Novel Trap.

Take a mackerel barrel, for instance, and fill it to about one-third its height with water. Then place a log endwise in the water, so that one end of it will just remain above the surface. Make the head of the barrel a little too small to fit, and suspend it by two pins to the inside of the top of the barrel, so that it will hang as if on a pivot and easily tip by touching either side. On this head, thus suspended, secure a piece of savory meat.—The first rat that scents it, will go to get the meat, leap on the barrel head. The head will tip, or tilt, precipitate him into the water, and resume its position. The rat in the water will swim to the leg, get on the end of it, and squeal vociferously. His cries will bring other rats, all of whom will be tilted into the water, and all of whom will fight for the only dry spot in it—viz: the end of the log. As only one rat can hold it, the victor will drown all the rest, and can, in the morning, be drowned himself. We have seen twenty rats caught in one night by such a trick.

CONSTIPATION AND CORN.—A tablespoonful of coarse corn-meal (Indian), stirred in a glass of cold water, and drank quickly, on rising in the morning, has frequently had an excellent effect in keeping the system healthy and free. Living for a week wholly on sweet, fresh, pure milk, with corn-meal mush, has a most wholesome effect where there is headache, dullness, cold feet, and an indifferant appetite. It would be well for dyspeptic persons to use corn-meal more freely in their diet, preparing it in a great variety of ways, so that it may not pall on the taste.—A delightful corn griddle cake is thus made: Scald at night half the quantity of meal you are going to use, mix the other with cold water, having it the consistency of thick batter; and a little yeast. In the morning the cakes will be light and crisp. Skimmings, where meat has been boiled, is best for frying them with. Fry slowly.—Hall's Journal of Health.

FREEDING-BOXES BETTER THAN RACKS.—Horses do not naturally gather their food from trees, why then should they be compelled in winter to take it from a rack overhead? Every mouthful requires the animal to assume an unnatural position, which with young horses particularly must interfere with the proper development of the muscles of the neck and with the graceful carriage of the head. May not the awkward manner in which many horses thrust their noses forward and upward be attributed to the force of habit acquired in feeding from a high rack? Another serious objection to racks is, the danger from the seeds, dust, &c., falling into the eyes of the animal; and further, all the effluvia of the stable, the vapors from liquid and solid excrements the exhalations from the skin and from the lungs, pass upward and are to some extent absorbed by the hay—an edition neither savory nor healthful.—The feeding box may be made equally convenient with the rack, and is open to none of the above objections. It need not be large, and if the bottom be made of slats, all rejected fodder can be easily removed. A closed box on one side for feeding grain will be needed, if the bottom of the main box be left open. The above may seem an unimportant matter to many but everything is worthy of attention which can add to the comfort and health of the noblest domestic animal.

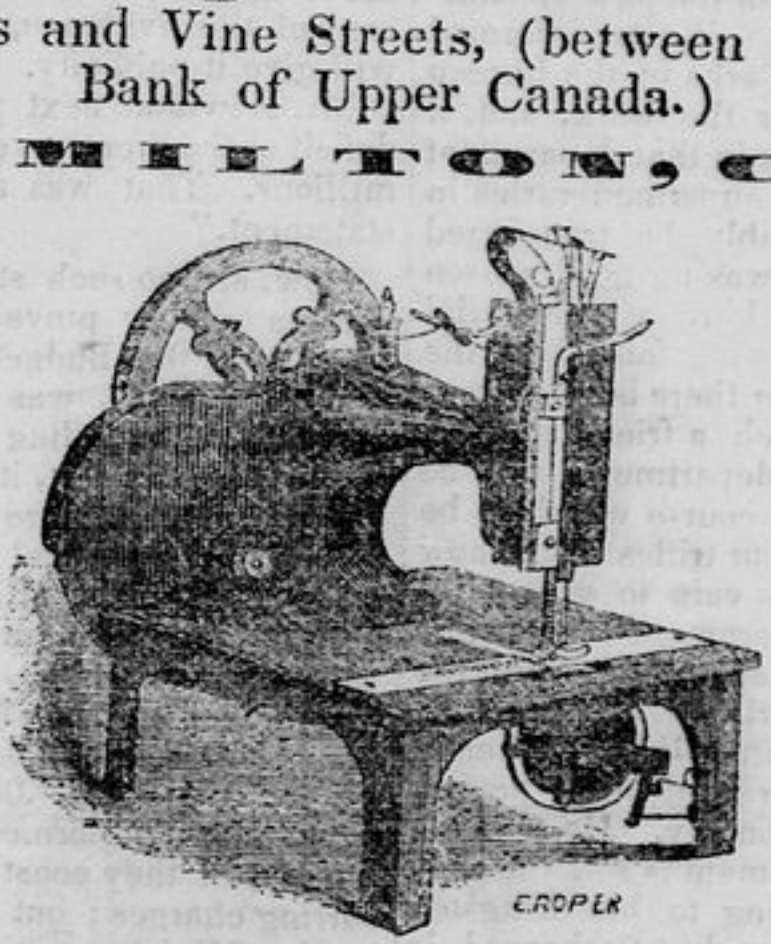
