

were highly satisfactory, and expressed themselves gratified on hearing him personally. Our space at command will not permit us to give even a brief synopsis of his speech to do it justice. He showed up the boasted retrenchment policy of the present ministry in discharging the temporary clerks who were engaged in the different departments at so much per day, while they were required, and appointing in their stead, permanent clerks, each at an annual salary. He ridiculed the statement of Mr. Blake and his friends, that the Ocean Steamship postal subsidy was reduced from \$416,000 to \$100,000 by the present ministry, when it is well known that the contract has to run to 1867. He said when the present ministry assumed power, the credit of the province was at a premium of seven per cent, but now it was reduced to five per cent discount, a difference of 12 per cent, and to extricate themselves from the difficulties in which the ministry were involved by their blundering, they have agreed to adopt a railway, which the most inexperienced politicians cannot fail to see would be ruinous to this country.

LONGEVITY.—The other day we recorded the demise of Mary Aikins, of Alton, at the advanced age of 104 years, and this week we have to chronicle the death of Mrs. Martha McDowell, another centenarian, who died in this village on the 16th ult., aged 104 years and some months. Mrs. McDowell's maiden name was Graham; she was a native of the County Armagh, Ireland, and emigrated to this country in 1831, where she resided up to the time of her death. Mrs. Aikins, we believe, was also a native of the Emerald Isle, but of what part we have not been able to learn. Both were of regular and active habits, and retained the use of their faculties unimpaired to the last.—Orangeville Sun.

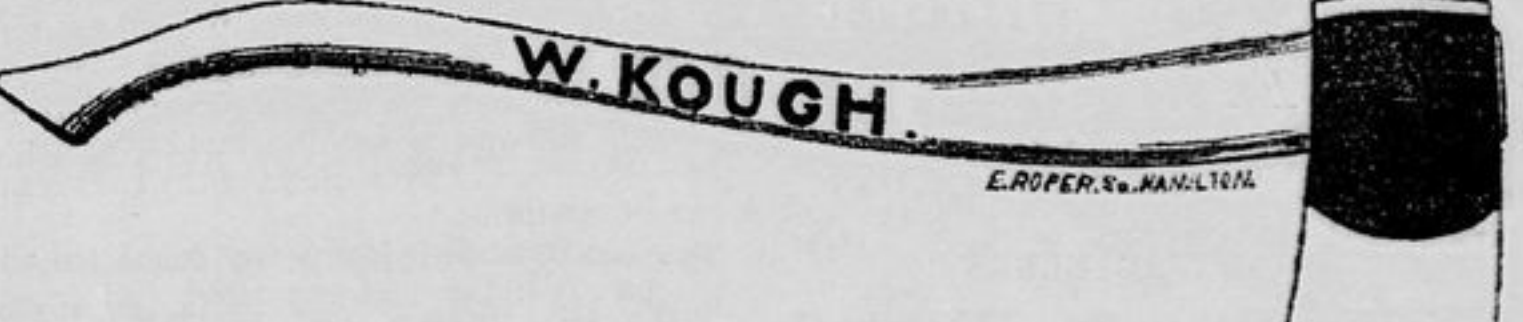
