The speech from the Throne contained the usual opening paragraphs - the greeting, thankfulness to Providence for an abundant harvest, and general prosperity, confidence in the faithful Commons to grant supplies, &c.

"Complications of a grave character," in the North-West Territories was ferred to, and a peaceful policy contended for, promising a measure providing for their government, as the Act for the temporary government will ad-

vise, at the close of the present session. A measure intended to insure safety to the community, and place the banking interests on a sound basis, is promised to be submitted.
