But it often happens that one or more of these conditions are lacking, and then the labor and means expended during the year are measur ably lost-or, negatively stated, the profit is not sufficient to compensate the Physicians Prescriptions carefully outlay. By the system of mixed husbandry the farmer may not, it is true, be able to derive immense profits from single crops, but it seldom happens that all of the crops will fail, and the profits accruing from the different sales will not repay this-especially when it is considered that if he has additional labor, he is safe from the weight of care and a xiety that oppress those hopes that are open every day (Sundays excepted) from 8 all dependent on the success of their wheat or corn, or other single crops. But every one must judge which system is best adapted to his means, and circumstances surrounding him.
