

A telegram from Kingston says:—Some over-ripe emigrants returned from the Bay of Quinte this morning, having refused one dollar and fifty cents per day. They are anxious to return home and beg.

The fire at Constantinople was the most destructive that has visited that city—famous for great conflagrations—for a century. It destroyed seven thousand dwellings and three hundred lives. The loss of property is computed at one hundred and twenty-five millions of dollars—enough to pay the interest on the United States' national debt for one year. The insurance was held, for the most part, by English companies.
