Chicago, Aug. 25 .- A letter from the Red River country, dated Aug. 17, says :- The Provisional authorities held a council at Fort Garry for the purpose of deciding the question of allowing the Canadian expedition to take possession of the country. It was determined that resistance would be useless, and Riel's men commenced plundering. Colonel Wolseley's command was expected about the 20th inst., and it was believed that by that time all the prominent rebels would be out of the settlement.

A New Cattle Plague.

A new cattle disease has broken out in several of the Western Counties, including Grey. The disease is thus des-

"In cattle its first makes its appearnodes or gatherings in rear of the front feet, at the joint, thence creeping upwards, infecting the flesh to the bone and swelling the leg to an unnatural size. Behind the knees the skin cracks borizontally, the part soon begins to bleed, inflame, and emit putrid matter If neglected, the swelling extends to the breast, the animal's legs being forced outwards by the abnormal magnitude. Sometimes this breaks out in monstrous boils or ulcers, setting free an enormous amount of putrescent, mephitic substance-and in other cases the disease strikes into the vitals, and kills he animal. Sometimes there is little or no swelling, the disease developing itself in the shape of numerous small heads or sores over the legs. The hind legs are sometimes attacked, but more rarely, while the rest of the body appears to escape altogether. Holes are eater into the legs and breast, by the putrid matter, from the size of a honey cell to cavities wherein a man could insert his fist. In milder cases the disease abates of its own accord, the swelling, loss of hair, and sores soon coming to a stand still, and finally passing away without any apparent effect. In horses and pigs the same general manifestations are reen, the symptoms in the former being first seen beneath the fetlocks, and sesembling an aggravated attack of the "scratches." To make matter worse, an active and pestiferous fly (something like a common house-fly, but largerwith a greenish tinge on the back) fas tens upon the exposed parts, (it is believed) leaves a poisonous deposit. They are prodigious blood suckers, and appear in such numbers that their victims soon refuge in the vivers and ereeks, where they stand day a ter day, in crowds, soder a roasting sun, 25 silent and motionless as the sculptured bulls of Egypt.
