

along the borders of Belgium avoiding any encounter with the Prussians that would be likely to involve a pitched battle. By this movement, he will be enabled to leave the Prussians in the south, and, will probably effect a junction with Bazaine north of Metz.

**TAKEN PRISONER.**  
London, Aug. 27.—Gen. Moutaign, who was wounded, according to the Paris *Monitor* was taken prisoner by the Prussians.

Berlin, Aug. 29, 6 p.m.—The Prussian general headquarters are unusually at St. Dixier.  
Great quantities of stores for the use of the Prussian army are accumulating at Nancy.

**NETZ COMPLETELY INVESTED.**  
At eight o'clock this morning Metz was completely invested. Marshal Bazaine, who is in command there, makes no effort to force a passage. Descriers report the extreme demoralization of the garrison. The Prussians are strongly entrenched before the place.

Of the three new armies just organized in Germany, one will march on Paris with the Prince Royal, and the other will remain to protect the rear.  
Paris, Aug. 27.—One of the city journals this evening has a remarkable editorial of which the following is an extract:—

"Next to the news of the near approach of the Prussians to the walls of Paris, that which most occupies the public attention is the possibility of an open rupture between the government and General Trochu. It is reported that the Empress has demanded the dismissal of Gen. Trochu from his position as Governor of Paris, but he can affirm nothing positive. It is, nevertheless, true that a person has been permitted to express carelessly the opinion that Trochu, in the presence of the Empress had been asked to retire."

**NEARLY RESOLUTION.**  
A late copy of the *Journal* of Nancy says:—"That which wounds us more than all else is the condition of the unfortunate farmer dwellers in our country, our tears flow at the sight of long lines of waggons laden with oats, hay and provisions of every kind to be given over to the Prussian army. The fine horses, which were to prepare the earth for the seed of future harvests, have been harnessed to Prussian cannon—since everything is scattered and destroyed in this way, after the harvest it equally follows that a remarkable barrenness of the country must ensue. The difficulties of the entire year are crowded into one moment. The ruin is complete and unrepairable. Long years will be necessary to repair the damages of these few days."

"We learn that before the army of the Prince Royal set out to march on Paris the King held at Pont a Mousson a council of war composed of Generals and Princes commanding the Prussian forces. The advice of all was to remain in the territory conquered, fortifying the right bank of the Moselle. The King alone determined to march on Paris. The Prince Royal slept the night before last at Chalons Prefecture. In case of a siege of Paris Government officials other than ministers will go to Toulon, Bourges and Lyons to administer to the provinces uninvaded by the enemy."

**THE PEOPLE AND THE INVASION.**  
The *Figaro* says:—  
"Contrary to the line of conduct hitherto pursued—and the change is sufficient to show how often the military plans of the French have been modified during the last week by the authorities—the people are invited to impede the enemy by all possible means. Bridges are to be blown up, railways cut, roads blocked, scouts killed and the Prussians harassed in flank and rear."
