### IS SAID TO BE 130 YEARS

MIGUEL VEJAR THE OLDEST MAN IN AMERICA.

Has Suffered Hardships, Drank Many a Gallon of Whiskey, Smoked Cigarttes, Violated All the Laws of Hygiene and Yet Lives to Be Probably the eldest Man in the World.

The oldest living person in the United States is a half-breed Indian, Miguel Vejar, who lives in the valley of the San Jacinto, in Riverside County, Southern California. He is one hundred and thirty years old. In 1891 Thief Urbaza died on the tribal reservation near San Diego, aged one hundred and twenty-seven years. Miguel Vejar was born in Northern Mexico at about 1766.

His wonderful age is verified by the records that were carefully kept until 1831 by the priests in the Franiscan Missions of Southern California. In [ 1831 they were transferred to the Cathedral of San Luis Rey, in the Cty of Mexico. Among the San Dieg records of the Indians is the statement, | dated August 9, 1788, that "liguel Vejar, a Mexican Indian, ratherintelligent, of good habits and very hdustrious, aged twenty-two," was a valuero of the mission herds. In March 1791, there is an entry of the birth of a female child to Miguel Vejar, uged twenty-five, and his wife Lugrdo, aged twenty-four.

The records of the San Gabriel Iission, now in the cathedral in the lity of Mexico, show that Miguel Vjar, "son of

parentage and aged thirty-three yers,' was baptized in the mission by Faher Romero, Easter Sunday, March, 799. The late Don Pico, who was the last Spanish Governor in California, sad a few years ago that he remembred Miguel Vejar in 1844, and that the nan was then upward of eighty year of age. Many people remember then Miguel passed his one hundredth brthday. When President Harrison was in California in 1891 old Miguel was brought from his miserable old buse in San Jacinto Valley and presente to Gen. Harrison as the oldest man in the United States. At that time theold fellow was able to speak a little boken English and told a few facts in the story of his life. Since then his mmory of English words has compleely failed, and when he now speaks at all it is in a mixture of Spanish and Cohilla Indian dialect.
