The Hon. William McKinley, President elect of the United States, is not likely to advocate a commercial policy favorable to Canadian interests.

A Washington correspondent of The Chicago Record says that the President elect will in all probability do his utmost to pinch Canadians into annexation, by raising the tariff-wall, depriving Canadian railways of the bonding privileges and by using every other means to injure the commerce of the Dominion.

Should our trade with the United States be cut off our people will realize perhaps more than ever the importance of a closer unity of the Empire; the tide of commerce will turn into other channels; fast lines of steamships will be built, and the coercive policy will culminate in a stronger Canadian independence.

Speaking on the question, a few days ago at a banquet given by the St. George's Society in London Sir Chas. Tupper said that if the Dominion were isolated it must fall into the lap of the United States.

HUGH JOHN MACDONALD M. P. for Winnipeg was unseated on Friday last, the only charge proved being the payment by an agent of forty dollars for four teams to carry votes to the polling booths.

DISTRIBUTION OF SAMPLES FROM THE CENTRAL EXPERIMENTAL FARM AT OTTAWA.

To the Editor of THE CHRONICLE.

During the past nine years, samples of these varieties of grain which have succeeded best on the Experimental Farms have been distributed on application in 3-lb. bags to farmers in all parts of the Dominion, free through the mail.

The distribution now in progress consists of some of the most promising sorts of Oats, Barley, Spring Wheat, Peas, Field Corn and Potatoes. Requests for samples may be sent to the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, at any time before the 1st of March.

The samples of grain will be sent early, but potatoes cannot be distributed until the danger of injury in transit by frost is over.
