He says:-" My object in writing this letter is to inform mechanics, laboring men and others that have to work for wages, that the Kootarey country is overstocked with workmen of all kinds; the wages are low and the hours of labor long (10 hours per day). The wages for carpenters are from \$2.50 to \$3 a If this Rule were better observed by day; laborers get \$2 and \$1.75. The latter figure was the one paid to the men that worked on the new railroad line from Northport to Rossland, and they had to pay \$5 a week for board, and pack their own blankets at that. That is the style here; most all working men have to pack their blankets and sleep in any kind of a shack. The country is full of prospectors, and very few make much out of it. For one that makes anything; twenty miss. There are hundreds of men putting in the winter in miserable shacks around Rossland that cannot get anything to do. Then, everything is high. There are few hotels that charge less\_than \$2 per day. 
