MOSS LAKE.

Mr. Editor,—I suppose your readers would like to know where Moss Lake is located. It is south-west of the thriving town of Priceville on the farm of Mr. Roger McEachern Lot 50 Con. 2 South Line Glenelg In olden times it used to be a resting place for pleasure-seekers during the summer months. The country to the west is somewhat level and some excellent farms can be seen near there.

On Artemesia side is quite elevated and is sometimes known as the Highland Hills, for the good residents are mostly of a true Highland blood, such as McLeans, McMillans etc; and are all good farmers. South, for miles, is almost a dead level country and some beautiful farms can be seen along the highway to Dromore through the valley, known as Balsam Valley, although there are not many evergreens to be seen along the way. Immediately north we find a lot of broken and swampy marsh land which is not fit for cultivation. Here some fifty years in the history of the past the early settlers substituted for tea the leaves of a peculiar kind of weed which grows in the beaver-meadows and for naiae they called it "Beaver Tea". It was exactly like Senna leaves only of a different effect on the system and any little boy who ever experienced both ingredients could not find any difference in the two, but tea becoming cheap none has been in use for the last thirty or forty years. Near this place was erected a part of a grist and sawmill but the builder, like the foolish man, did not at the commencement sit down and consider the cost and had to stop short after getting the skeleton erected which stood for a quarter of a century until finally the present proprietor of the farm converted it recently into a horse stable. Near this place is the residence of the late Rev. Robt. McIntyre. To him the Baptist church owes a debt of gratefulness for being the means of upbuilding that congregation in the locality in the early history of the church.

Side road 50 as it is generally known, along side of this lake was in olden times a main road leading into the townships of Proton and Egremont but it has been abandoned for the last twenty-five years from the gravel road to second concession south. Some of the best farmers now in these townships used to come to Durham Mills with oxen and jumper and half a load of hay for the animals besides a large grist, probably of frozen wheat which was not an unusual thing to be found in these townships when the country was newly settled.
