Mr. Wm. Lennox, who has had Tom Glencross's farm rented for some years moved to the other side of Markdale last week.

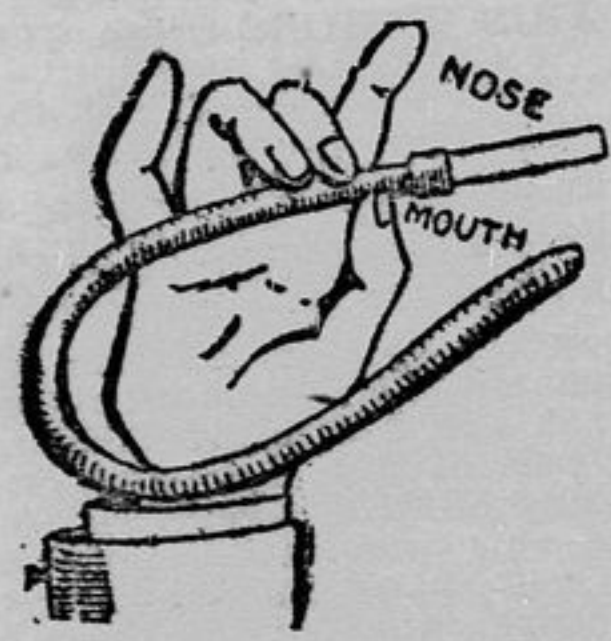
A gathering of the Menagerie this week under its old ring-master!
