GENERAL.

At Chatsworth last Friday James Minorgan, a blacksmith, and Edward Wicklow, Sullivan township, farmer, were committed to stand their trial at the approaching Assizes on a charge of robbery. The particulars of the case are as follows:—Mr. Jas. Dundas, an old bachelor, lived with his nephew, Wicklow, about one mile from Chatsworth in the township of Sullivan. It appears that he had drawn some money from Telford & Co., some weeks ago and had been in the habit of keeping it in a purse under his head in the bed where he was lying ill. About midnight on Sunday, March 20th, while in bed in a large room upstairs, into which the stairway led, and while Mr. and Mrs. Wicklow were in their room with the door open immediately facing the head of the stairs, a man with his face blackened came upstairs and demanded money from Mr. Dundas. He caught hold of Mr. Dundas and commenced searching under the pillows. Not finding any there he started to rummage through the bed and found a purse in a waistcoat pocket at the head of the bed, all the time threatening to shoot Mr. Dundas should he attempt to rise. Sleeping with Mr. Dundas was a lad fourteen years of age named Hopkins, who is a brother of Minorgan's wife. The robber after securing the money proceeded down stairs, and was followed by Wicklow, who then, and only then, came out of his room. Mr. Dundas swore out a warrant against Wicklow and Minorgan and the preliminary hearing took place at Mr. Jas. Dudgeon's house, where Mr. Dundas is lying ill, before Mr. Jno. McDonald and Mr. Jno. Cameron, J. P.'s, when the accused were committed for trial, bail being accepted. Mr. A. G. MacKay looked after the interests of the Crown.—O. S. Advertiser.

Reports respecting the condition of the health of the Hon. Geo. A. Kirkpatrick, Lieut. Governor of Ontario, are conflicting. One day we hear his physicians have no hope of his recovery and by the next cable the news comes that he is improving nicely and will start for home about the 21st. of April.

A novel method of presenting the newest and freshest Eastertide creations of Paris milliners has been adopted by The Ladies Home Journal for March. In that magazine the new French hats and bonnets will be pictured as they are worn. This unique display is useful, therefore, in pointing out clearly not only fashion's decree, but the styles in head-dress best suited to several contrasted types and faces.

Mr. Fitzpatrick's new Franchise Act, instead of being a very simple measure, turns out to be a very bulky bill of 156 clauses, making 68 printed pages, and, from a cursory examination of it appears to be quite as complicated as the present Act. Some twenty Acts of Parliament passed since 1885 are repealed in whole or in part. The provincial franchises are adopted with the addition that officers and men of the Northwest Mounted police and of the permanent force are disfranchised. The draft which Mr. Fitzpatrick brought down last week is the seventh that has been prepared by the government. It is admittedly incomplete as it does not embody the principle of one man one vote which the Liberal press says is to be brought into force. When the bill is law no two provinces will be represented in the same way in Parliament. Ontario members will be returned on lists based on Manhood Suffrage less city and town postmasters who are disfranchised. Quebec Members will represent owners or tenants of property of \$300 in cities and \$200 elsewhere. Nova Scotia member will represent owners or tenants of real property of \$150 or owners of personal property of \$150 and over, less all government employees, who are disfranchised. New Brunswick members will represent owners or tenants of real property worth \$100 or personal property worth \$400 or persons assessed for \$400 income. Prince Edward Island members will represent males who have to pay a rental of at least \$5 a year who have done statute labor or paid poll tax. British Columbia members will represent all the men there except Indians and Chinese. Manitoba members will be elected on the basis of manhood suffrage, except that all government employees receiving \$350 will be disqualified.

Mr. Gibson introduced a bill in parliament to so amend the Railway Act that the employee's wages and cost of material for construction be a first lien on the work.

Mgr. Mery Del Val, the papal delegate was welcomed in Ottawa on Saturday last by Archbishop Duhamel and the local clergy. Among the notables present were the premier, Messrs. Tarte, Scott, Fitzpatrick, Costigan, Landerkin and McMullen. The addresses were in Latin, French and English.

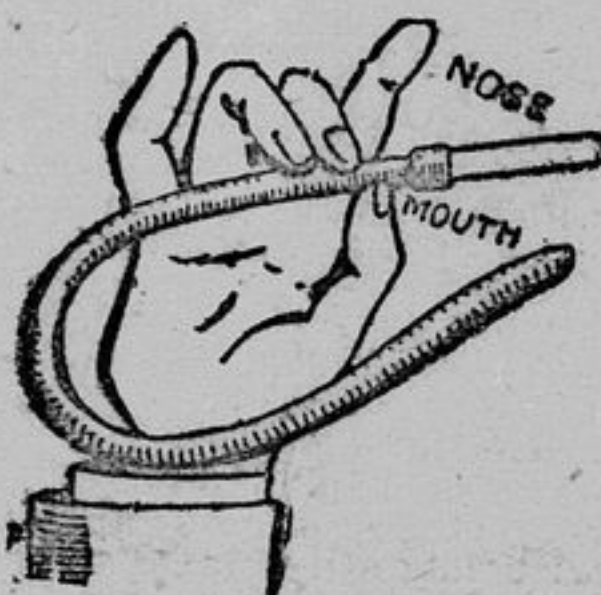
