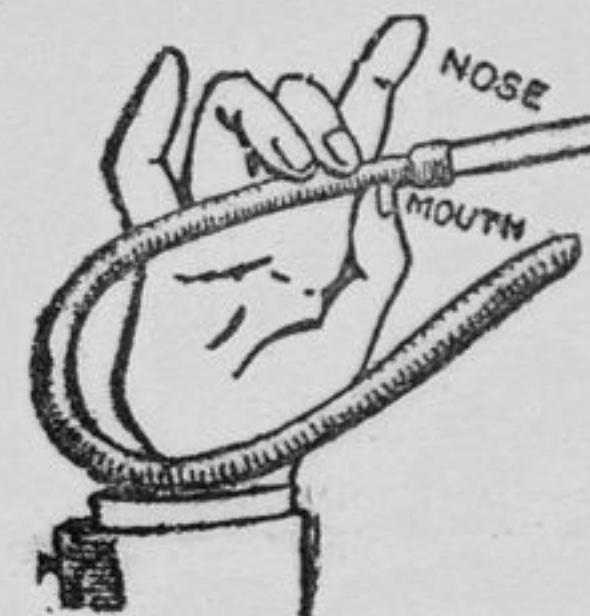

THE CRABB PATENT FENCE,

It will be news for the farmers of Bentinck and Normanby to learn that their right to build the "two stake" stake and rider fence is again to be brought before the Courts. It will be remembered by our readers that in August last one Elijah Page brought action against Messrs. Fulton, Brown and O'Neil in the Division Court claiming damages because they had built fences upon their land which he claimed was an infringement on a Patent Fence of which he was the owner. At the trial Mr. Elliott, who appeared for the defendants, moved for and was granted a nonsuit and the cases were accordingly dismissed. Since then nothing has been heard of the matter, but last week Messrs. MacKay and Hatton, of Owen Sound, on behalf of the same Mr. Page instituted three separate actions in the County Court against Mr. Fulton, Mr. Brown and Mr. O'Neil for damages for infringing his Patent fence. These actions will we suppose come up for trial in due course at Owen Sound and the question will then be finally settled whether the farmers have a right to build these fences or not. As the matter is now before the Court we cannot of course enter into a criticism of these actions, but we must say that if these gentlemen are liable in damages for building a fence which has been in use for years before any Patent was ever issued. The sooner it is known the better for our part. We think such law pure nonsense, and we trust all the farmers who have this fence will unite with the Gentlemen who have been sued and resist the claim. Mr. Elliott has again been retained by the defendants and will look after their interests.
