Through an oversight on our part Miss Bull's paper was not referred to in our report of the Teachers' Convention. "Teaching Literature to a Third Class," was the title of the paper. It was a very thoughtful production in which the essayist gives evidence of being a practical observer in the commonplace things of the school room. Miss Bull in the course of her remarks showed the importance of thoroughness in every selection. She found the necessity for it in her own teaching experience and gave instances where even with the greatest care the student formed wrong conceptions and wholly misapprehended the authors meaning. She says:— A few weeks ago we studied and I thought thoroughly the poem "The Burial of Sir John Moore." The next week we studied "The Burial of Moses." Last week I asked the pupils to produce in their own words "The Burial of Sir John Moore." By the majority of the class the story was well told, but here is the story as given by a quiet dreamy little girl: "Sir John Moore was an officer in the British Army, who was killed at the Battle of Corunna. After he was dead the angels of God buried him in the Mountain of Moab in Westminster Abbey. While they were burying him they heard the angels singing and the organ ringing. After they buried him they fired three shots and marched home." The paper was much appreciated. One young gentleman teacher told us he thought it was the best paper given at the Convention.

Inspector Campbell was overlooked also. He did not speak on the subject assigned him, but gave some good practical advice that would be well for every teacher to hear and put into practice.

Miss Coppinger, of Hanover said before the Convention she would walk all the way to Markdale rather than miss it. When it was over she said she would walk twice as far rather than be absent. This is pluck, worthy of admiration.
