EGREMONT COUNCIL.

Council met July 10th. Minutes of previous meeting sustained.

David McIntyre presented a petition signed by himself and seven others soliciting aid to improve the road at the North East part of con 22.

McInnis-Leith-That said petition be entertained and two culverts be put in between lots 25, con 21-22, grading about 20 rods on each side of roadway, where road is very bad at present. Carried.

Councillor McInnis reported that he had examined the bridge at lots 5-6, con 15 and recommended that something should be done. Before attempting to let the building timber be first removed.

Leith-Russell-That foregoing report be adopted. Carried.

Bye-Russell-That con Leith put the bridge at sideroad 20, con 20 in proper state of repair. Carried.

John Phillip and John Bunston complained of obstruction of watercourse lot 16, con 16.

Bye-Russell-That the reeve examine and report. Carried.

A petition signed by Jas. Goldies and 22 others soliciting aid to ditch 40 rods, lots 15, 16, con 18.

McInnis-Bye-That said petition be entertained and \$12 be granted providing those interested complete the work. Carried.

A petition signed by Frank Coultis and 33 others asking a new bridge and removal of driftwood on baseline, con 13.

Leith-McInnis-That foregoing petition be entertained and the reeve be instructed to examine bridge on base line and report at next meeting. Carried.

McInnis-Leith-That by-law No 47 be so amended that Geo. Watson's statute labor be done in road division No 5, con 21, 22, instead of the towline as at present. Carried.

McInnis-Russell-That Wm Wilder be paid \$9 in payment for board for W Williams to the 23rd day of June last. Carried.

Leith-Russell-That Chas McInnis see that Coultis' bridge on 10th sideroad north of Yeovil, also bridge opposite the saw-mill east of Yeovil be made safe for the travelling public. Carried.
