DURHAM, August 19th, 1897.

GENERAL.

Mr. Daniel Spry, Post office Inspector of London, died of Bright's disease on Thursday last.

Owing to the immense crops of hay in Ontario this year the railroad companies have agreed to make a reduction in freight rates for exportation.

Sir Wilfred and Lady Laurier were in Rome and the premier had an interview with the pope, who was very anxious to get information regarding the state of affairs in Canada particularly on the subject of Manitoba Schools.

An Euphemia township farmer named William J. Murphy, while in the General Hospital at Chatham, Ont., threw himself out of a window on Saturday night, and died two hours afterwards as the result of the injuries received in the fall.

A most terrific thunderstorm accompanied by wind and rain passed over Toronto on Saturday last. A \$2000 fire occurred in the city and a number of tents were demolished at the island. Much damage was done to crops throughout the country.

A most brutal murder is reported from near Galt. About a week ago a woman named Mrs. Orr mysteriously disappeared from her home and a diligent search was made which resulted on Sunday last in the discovery of the body in a shallow grave in a cornfield near by.

The Bureau of Forestry of Ontario has just issued its annual report, which presents a clear view of existing conditions in the Province as regards the forests and the timber supply, as well as much practical information for farmers on tree-planting and preservation.

The importance of forestry to the farmers is urged, and figures are given, compiled from the statistics of the Bureau of Industries, showing the extent to which deforestation has been carried in many of the older settled districts.

A GREAT SPECTACLE.

The proposed reproduction of a portion of Her Majesty's Great Diamond Jubilee Procession in London, with ceremonies in front of St. Paul's Cathedral, and immense tableaux of incidents during the Queen's Reign, at the Toronto Exhibition from the 30th of August to 15th Sept., is creating much interest throughout the Dominion, and thousands will go to Toronto to see it from all parts.
