WHITNEY AT MARKDALE. ROUSING CONSERVATIVE RALLY. THE HARDY GOVERNMENT SEVERELY CRITICISED. On Tuesday night a most enthusiastic gathering of Liberal, Conservative and others assembled in the Rink Hall to listen to no less a personage than Mr. Whitney, Leader of the Conservative party in the Ontario Legislature. Other able representatives of the Conservative side politics were also present amongst whom were Dr. Sproule and Colonel Matheson but we shall confine our remarks particularly to the address of Mr. Whitney. On taking the platform the ovation that greeted him gave unmistakable evidence of the healthy state of public opinion and the growing and absolute necessity for a change in the administration of our local politics. After referring to the address of welcome and expressing his appreciation of the hearty way in which he was received, he launched out in a most convincing argument to show wherein improvements in the administration of public affairs were needed. He was pleased to see so large a number of ladies present, and that the fair sex were interested in the government of the country. Nothing but good could come out of the interest they manifested. He thought it was "time to have a change" and gave reasons for his opinion. In taking up the financial aspect of the question he showed that the province was face to face with direct taxation and graphically described the results of forcing every ratepayer to put his hand in his pocket to pay out hard cash to meet the expenditure of the province. If the resources of the country had been properly handled there would be no such necessity. The government had shown its incapacity and an earnest appeal was made for such assistance as would place us on a safe basis. He eulogized Sir John Macdonald and the glorious possibilities of the Dominion. The sensible young man would estimate his assets and regulate his expenditure accordingly. Ontario got a good start but mismanagement had sapped her of her strength since the government left the hands of Sandfield Macdonald. New offices were created and multiplied; money was borrowed year after year, yet the transactions were denied. The discovery by the opposition brought the government to task. The treasurer was compelled to admit that borrowing had been done and that three million dollars would be necessary to meet the country's indebtedness. Why not pay the provincial debt if they had such a surplus as they claim to have? Why sell timber areas and crown lands to meet the annual expenditure? The school system needed remodeling. The efforts of the opposition to give better terms to the rural schools had been frustrated. Rural pupils should receive additional advantages. We have already too many High Schools and their cost of maintenance is too great. The ninety-five per cent who never leave the public schools should receive the consideration of the government. His reference to the financial, educational and mining policies was a revelation to all, of the extravagance and mismanagement of the present administration and showed the necessity for a change.

NOTES. Dr. Sproule entertained the speakers. The hall was packed. The decorations were beautiful and the mottoes appropriate and prophetic. Mr. Thomas Kells was chairman. Representatives were present from Meaford, Thornbury, Flesherton, Priceville, Walter's Falls and other places. The procession from the train was led by the band. The best of order prevailed. MR. AND MRS. CHARLES McARTHUR returned home from their wedding trip on Monday night last. The band were among the first to call on them and got an X for which they were X-ceedingly grateful.
