Reg. V. Stewart—Rowell for defendant, moved absolute a rule nisi to quash a summary conviction made by two justices of the peace for the County of Grey (presumably under section 523 (b) of the Criminal Code), for that the defendant "wrongfully and without lawful authority did intimidate the complainant by using threats of violence to him," upon the ground that the conviction is bad on its face, in that it does not disclose any offence, and that no offence is disclosed by the information or evidence, and asked for the costs of the proceedings to quash against the private prosecutor. W. R. Riddell, for the private prosecutor, contra. Rule absolute, quashing conviction without costs. No action to be brought against the justices. Toronto Dailies of October 7th. This was a conviction made last April in Durham in a case in which Thomas Stewart was charged by Duncan McArthur with intimidation. Mr. Batson, the defendant's Counsel appealed and the case was argued at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, before Justices Boyd, Ferguson and Meredith, resulting in a decision as above stated.
