Council met pursuant to adjournment. All the members present. The minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Council to be furnished with 750 seven inch tiles to continue the tile culvert from his land for some distance north along sideline lot 20 con 10 to a proper fall. Mr. Seim to haul tiles, pay expenses for laying them and to maintain culvert. Commissioners Grier and Forbes to inspect proposed water-course along lot 10 con 5, said parties to take no action until further notice from council. JUSTICE CALLED FOR

(To the Editor of The Chronicle.)

Dear Sir,—I read a great deal about roads and I am sure there is much need of improvement in some parts of the township of Bentinck. For some time I have been trying to get the council interested in a road to my farm which is much needed. The road is very dangerous and with threshers, binders and other heavy loads I am obliged to go through the fields of my neighbors and this I think is unfair and unjust. I may say too that I pay a tax of from twelve to fifteen dollars a year and should have some little consideration from the council. So far they have done nothing to remedy the grievance and I regard it an absolute necessity to press my claim if I have to resort to the newspaper to do so. A commission was at one time appointed but nothing was done. Want of money was the plea. All that has been allowed for thirty years is the privilege of doing my statute labor twice on the part of the road I am most interested in. The Councilman for No. 3 has not taken the trouble to change the path-master, the same one as last year being reappointed. I think it would be well to let the honors go round. If they have no money it would be satisfying, in return for taxes, to do a share of statute labor where so much needed.

Knechtel in account of Hanover Electric Lights account; \$2.00 to James S. Wilson for statute labor paid by Boyle and expended by him; the balance on Smith's was laid over for further information; \$35.00 in Division No. 4 and \$15.00 in Division No. 1 for road im-provement were granted; \$1.50 was granted to repair culvert in Elmwood; Collector of the other of John W. Miller of \$25.00 for old roadway on S. L. 15, con 14 was accepted, as money is paid over.

The following grants were made to individuals: John Pyke 3.00; J. H. McEwan 5.00. The taxes of Widow Schultz, Elmwood, for 1896, were remitted.
