From F. S. Spence, a petition on Local Option. Williams-McFadden—That cheques be issued favor of School Boards for current expenses and payments of debentures to the

amount of \$3658.17 being the total amount levied for such purposes, also a favor of in digents for their monthly allowances for the current half year amounting to \$60. Car. McMillan-McFadden—That Robert McDonald be paid \$3 for 30 days' work certified by Pathmaster.

Williams-McFadden—That the collector for ward 1 be instructed to strike off \$2 for two days' statute labor charged against Mrs. McComb.

Lamb-McMillan—That Richard Haley give \$3 worth of good sound cedar to build a culvert at lot 17, con. 7, being in lieu of three days' unperformed statute labor charged on roll for 1897.

McMillan-McFadden—That \$10 be granted towards building an Agricultural Hall in the village of Priceville.

Williams-Lamb—That the council grant \$50 to gravel Lambton st, providing grants the same to the chair, which they be by the dep. reeve.

McMillan-Lamb—That the thanks of this council are due and are hereby tendered to James Staples, Esq., reeve, for the impartial manner in which he has presided over this council during the year now coming to a close, and not forgetting to tender our sincere thanks to the clerk and treasurer for their obliging and courteous manner in the performance of their official duties while we have been in office.
