NORMANBY COUNCIL.

The council elected for the Tp. of Normanby for the year 1898 met pursuant to statute on January 10th, when the following named gentlemen made and subscribed their declarations of qualifications and of office as members of said council, viz.—Robert Morrice reeve; Charles Forbes, 1st deputy reeve; Wm. J. O'Reilly, 2nd deputy reeve; and John Dreier and James P. Black, councillors.

The following officers were appointed: Thomas Duignan and Charles Heise, Auditors; Mich. Murray, assessor; G. Heipel, Wm. Umbach, J. J. Weinert, M. H. Mearns, Thomas Stephenson, and D. Holiday, collectors; James Edwards, surveyor; J. Weinert, sr., member of local board of health; M. O. McGregor, T. Solicitor; Mrs. Welch, caretaker of town hall. Auditors to receive each \$3 as salary and no extra; Assessor \$1200 said amount to include attendance at court of revision; collectors each \$21; caretaker of town hall \$13.

The following accounts were ordered to be paid:—L. Flick for three cords of wood for town hall \$2.50; Clerk to defray expenses of late municipal election \$56.57; The Municipal Ward, election blanks and stationery \$12.64; Mrs. Welch, salary in advance a caretaker of town hall \$12; Councilors for services at meeting of date \$12.50; Mary Wiley, an indigent, received \$5 as charity.

Commissioners appointed as follows: Mr. Dreier for south-west division including 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10 concessions from lots 1 to 20 inclusive; Mr. O'Reilly for north-west division including 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, and 18th concessions from lots 1 to 10 inclusive; Mr. Forbes for northeast division including 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, and 18th concessions from lots 21 to both inclusive and 1, 2, 3 concessions from Bentinck township to Beatrice Saugree River; Mr. Black, including 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10th concessions from Lots 21 to 37 both inclusive and 1, 2, and 3rd concessions from named river to Arthur and Minto townline.

EGREMONT BOARD OF HEALTH.

Members met Jan 24th, according to statute, all the members present.

Allan—Snell—That Mr. Renwick be Chairman.

Snell—Dickson—That the Municipality be divided in the following manner for each member of the Board to supervise: To Mr. Allan, all that portion of the Old Survey from Glenside townline South, to Mr. Swanston's side-line. To Mr. Dickson, all that portion of the old survey South from Mr. Swanston's side-line to the boundary line, including Silge road and boundary to Mr. Caulfield's, Con's 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10. To Mr. Rowick, Con's 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, and 22.

Caulfield—Dickson—That the Secretary draft the several sections of the Public Health Act relating to contagious diseases and get at least 50 copies printed and forward a copy to each teacher and School in the Tp. said copy to be posted up permanently in the school for the mutual benefit and guidance of both teacher and pupils in order to prevent as much as possible the spread of any contagion, and to forward a copy for the approval of the School Inspector before being printed, and also to recommend all school walls to be cleaned once a year.—Carried.

Snell—Caulfield—That Section 13 of amendments to P. H. Act be adopted, and the Secretary get a sufficient number of placards printed to distribute among the physicians practising in in this municipality.

Caulfield—Dickson—That we adjourn until called to meet by the chairman.—Carried.
