different descriptions of various sections of the vast Yukon region, which bearing belt, stretching from California north to Yukon, must be understood. North of the international boundary in this balt is Kootenay; north of Kootenay and above the Canadian Pacific Railway are Cariboo and Omineca and Cassiar, the first and last named famous fifty years ago for the wealth of their placer gold beds. North beyond these is an utterly unexplored region; north of this, the Yukon, which may be described as practically unexregion. Equally significant is the fact that the waters flowing through in placer gold, take their rise mainly in the same untrodden district. Whatever the geological theories regarding refractory and quartz gold, there is only one explanation of placer gold, and it is rather the working hypothesis of practical men than the theory of scientists, namely, that the gold found down from its main source by these waters. Actual facts support this supposition in the case of the territory south and east of Klondike. Last August the writer saw a solid and beautiful gold nugget, worth more than three hundred dollars, which had been found on the southern outskirts of
