A NOBLE FIGHT AGAINST A DETERMINED BAND OF LIBERALS.

THE BATTLE'S FOUGHT AND WON.

The latest report gives 44 Conservatives, 46 Liberals, 2 patrons, 1 Independent.

While we always felt a degree of certainty that we'd get there we never felt like being boastful. Our opponents are fighters from the word go, and in this contest they did excellent work for their candidate and through the energy displayed by the Liberals we missed our count on the opinion we formerly held of Mr. McNichol's chances. Every one worked and the battle throughout has been fought on the most amicable terms, consistent with political contests. In a day or two everything will be quiet again and we trust all will be better friends than before.

About nine p. m., Dr. Jamieson appeared on the balcony in front of the Middaugh House and heartily thanked the electors for the very liberal majority given him in this election and while representing the Conservatives he felt also grateful to the electors of different political views who for the time buried their political prejudices and voted for him on personal grounds. He wished also to admonish his friends not to say or do anything offensive to the defeated candidates. He himself suffered defeat and knew what it meant. The boys too were jubilant and joined heartily in a torch light procession in honor of the Doctor. Mr. Moffat spoke briefly referring to the victory which Grey had, in returning three Conservatives.

Notwithstanding the fact that last Tuesday was election day, it was one of the quietest days seen in Durham for a long time. Everyone, however was working in the interest of their political favorite. In town the result was generally conceded that a majority of about 100 would be given for Dr. Jamieson. About five o'clock crowds were seen pouring in from the country, and in a short time the results began to pour in from the different polling places, and in nearly every case a majority was registered for Dr. Jamieson. The magnificent majority of 130 in his own town speaks for his popularity as a citizen. In Mr. Morgan's own village, and in Mr. McNichol's own township, handsome majorities were rolled up for the Dr., which speaks volumes for his popularity in the outlying corners of the Constituency.

Just so, but the careless handling of the truth by an astute politician like Mr. Hardy will not prevent us from stating the facts, even at the risk of wounding the sensibilities of our esteemed Liberal cotem. Mr. Hardy's father has been dead some time, but held the position of storekeeper in the London Asylum prior to his demise.

The election throughout the Province has been hotly contested, and many changes have been made in the personnel of the government, but they still hold a majority in the house so far as we can learn this (Wednesday) morning. The following list gives the result as far as we can find out but at this early date we can not vouch for the accuracy of the majority. The Government though sustained has, we believe, an almost unworkable majority and even should Russell go Liberal, the majority over Conservatives and others omitting the speaker will be only 9. At the close of the last election the Liberals had a clear majority of seven over all the opposition, but of this opposition, a good support could reasonably be counted on from the Patron element which then numbered 17. This time no such fund is available.

As we write these lines (Tuesday) the battle for supremacy in the next Local Legislature is being fought under the leadership of "Captains" Hardy and Whitney. Throughout the Province honest men of all shades of politics are marking their ballots for what they regard as the country's best interests. Some are rendering allegiance to the man independent of his personal qualifications, but simply because he advocates the policy of a certain party; others are voting for the man because they believe him better and more honorable than his opponent. We are forced to believe that some have so low an estimate of the sacred privilege of the ballot as to make merchandise of their franchise and use it simply in return for a monetary consideration. Tonight, notwithstanding their sanguine hopes, many will find themselves disappointed when the ballots are counted. A good party must be composed of good men, and by whatever name a government may be called it will inevitably be good or bad according to the character of the constituent elements of which it is composed.

Here is a paragraph from The Municipal World which should be framed and hung in every municipal council chamber: "The Municipal Act provides that no council shall assume to make any appointment to office or any arrangement for the discharge of the duties thereof by tender, or to applicants at the lowest remuneration. The desire of every council should be to secure the most efficient administration of municipal affairs. This can only be done by appointing good men at salaries for which they can afford to properly perform the duties of their office. A poor man is dear at any price. Officers of experience whose services have been satisfactory should be retained, no matter how many personal friends of the councillors may be demanding recognition. Continuance in office should be a reward for efficient service. Independent, capable, permanent officials are a necessity in every municipality."
