IMPLEMENT DELIVERY.

Mr. Calder's Implement delivery on Tuesday last was well attended, though owing to the condition of the roads many of the purchasers were unable to be present. Three carloads of Massey-Harris machinery have been delivered at the station during the last few days, and these composed over sixty machines, consisting of Binders, Mowers, Seeders, etc., etc. A magnificent dinner had been provided at the Knapp House, where the purchasers and a number of invited guests to the number of sixty or seventy, shared the hospitality of Mr. Calder. A MINER FROM CARIBOO.

(London Advertiser.)

Mr. George Ferguson, a veteran miner and ex-member of the British Columbia Legislature, is in the city, and may join the exploration party which will leave shortly for the Klondyke under the direction of Mr. John A. Moody, broker. Mr. Ferguson has had 23 years' mining experience in the Cariboo district of British Columbia, and is enthusiastic over its possibilities. As an individual, Mr. Ferguson says he would go to the Klondyke, but a strong company, he thinks, would do better in Cariboo. The gold belt is very extensive, and in one there are six or eight different grades of gold from the fine dust to the nuggets. The dust on top was fine, and became coarser according to its depth, until the bed rock was reached. There nuggets were found from one to two ounces in weight—some larger. Every claim in the Cariboo district, he says, was taken up in three years, from 1858 to 1861, but the prospectors left when the excitement died out. The discoveries were very rich; one stretch of five miles yielded \$90,000,000. The shallow placer mining was entirely neglected, as the prospectors kept rushing hither and thither to some big strike. In 1876-77 miners began to pay some attention to placer mining, but they thought that Chinamen had cleaned out the shallow deposits, and it would take machinery to get out the other gold. With modern machinery the fields could be worked profitably. One or two of the mines would this season yield one-half ton of gold. It was an easy field to prospect, and in the next twenty years more money would be taken out than ever before. Hundreds of shafts had been sunk in the Cariboo district, but abandoned on account of the lack of capital and supplies. These could readily be worked by modern methods. The Cariboo district is considerably north of the Kootenay.
 (Mr. Ferguson is a brother of Rev. Mr. Ferguson of this town.—Ed.)

Found Himself in the Air

EXPERIENCE OF A YOUNG CANADIAN WHO WAS IN THE MAINE DISASTER.

Owen Sound, March 3.—The parents of Charles Frederick Pilcher, of this place, who was a seaman on the steamer Maine when she was blown up in Havana harbour, have received a letter from him, written by a nurse in the hospital at Key West by request of young Pilcher, who was injured. He says:—"I was on watch in the starboard gangway, and about to fall to sleep, lying on the bare deck, when suddenly I found myself going up into the air, turning round and round, never losing consciousness, and finally alighting in the water. I swam at once to the wreck of my ship, which distance I judge to have been about 200 yards. The ship was then sinking, and presently a Spanish cutter came along and picked me, with a number of others, up into the boat. I was taken to a hospital in Havana, where my legs from my knee down and both my arms from above the elbows, were bandaged up. The wounds I received probably through the ignited powder at the time of the explosion. M & Empire.
