STATEMENT.

EDITOR OF THE CHRONICLE:

DEAR SIR,—Kindly allow me space in your paper as I wish to make a statement in regard to the "Page Fence" suits that were engaging the attention of some of the farmers in the townships of Bentinck and Normanby last summer.

I think most of the readers of your paper in said townships are aware that actions in the court were instituted by one Elijah Page, of Owen Sound, against Messrs. O'Neil, Fulton and Brown, of the township of Bentinck, for having built straight rail fences on their farms.—said fences Mr. Page claimed as an infringement on a patent right he claims to hold; namely, the Crabb-patent fence. Those suits were defended by the united action of a large number of people, for whom I had the honor of being placed in the position of secretary and treasurer for that purpose.

I might here state that these cases were put back from time to time which caused delay as well as great expense until finally they were dismissed in Owen Sound in November last. Wishing to be brief, I give a summary account of receipts and disbursements instead of an itemised account of the whole.

OF INTEREST TO TEACHERS.—From a circular just issued from the Education Department we take the following items which may be of interest to teachers: The High School Entrance and Public School Leaving examinations for 1898 will begin on Tuesday June 28, at 8:45 a. m. The course of study prescribed for the examinations is that given in the revised regulations excepting that physiology and temperance take the place of botany at the public school leaving examinations. Any misunderstanding on the part of the candidates regarding the requirements is to be dealt with by the local boards in settling results. The revised regulations do not, as formerly, call for the presentation of book work in writing, drawing, etc., at either the High School Leaving exams. For the latter examination, bookwork, if presented by candidates, is to be taken into account, as last year, in view of the special provisions announced for 1898.

SINCE our last issue we have had a profitable interview with Mr. George Ferguson, brother of Rev. Mr. Ferguson here. He left Durham County England in 1862, and since the following year he has been in British Columbia, engaged during the whole period of 34 years in gold mining, with which he has a complete knowledge. part of the Dominion. From the brief interview we learned many things about the mining business, which to us were quite new. The quartz learing region, he says, is rich in gold, but heavy and expensive machinery is necessary for deep mining where best results are obtained. The tendency of gold is to sink to the hard surface beneath the earth only the finer portions being in any case found near the surface. In some cases nuggets weighing three or four ounces have been found from a depth of twenty-five to a hundred feet. Prospectors in bygone days secured only the surface gold, while the great untold wealth of the country is still beneath the ground. In speaking of the climate he said he was astonished at the letters and reports from that country. For seventeen years in the Rocky Mountains, owing to the dry, bracing and exhilarating character of the atmosphere, he never needed to wear an overcoat, yet at Victoria, where flowers bloom the year round, he had to use one owing to the humidity of the air. The difficulty in getting a sufficiency of fruit in these northern regions is in his opinion a prolific cause of mortality. He thinks fruit an essential, and with more fruit better health and greater longevity would be assured. In a few days Mr. Ferguson will, in all probability be heading a prospecting party for Northern Brit. Columbia or to the Klondike.
