DEATH OF MR. JNO. ROBERTSON FATHER OF MR. ADAM ROBERTSON, OF DURHAM.

(Guelph Mercury) Many of the citizens will be surprised to hear of the death of Mr. John Robertson, the well known milkman, as quite a number never knew he was sick till Monday. On Wednesday at noon he was taken sick; two physicians were summoned. From the first they held out no hope, and the deceased passed away on Monday afternoon. Mr. Robertson was of a quiet, unassuming disposition, and was noted for his honesty, straightforwardness and uprightness of character; he was a loving husband and a kind and indulgent father. He was in his 73rd year, and was born at Calder, Middlethian, Scotland, on the 14th of Feb., 1825. In his early years in Scotland he and his brothers assisted their father in the manufacture of paper, and it was while delivering paper that he became acquainted with Miss Elizabeth Wardlaw, of Battlegate, to whom he was married in 1848. In connection with these early years it is worthy of mention that his schoolmate, Mr. Alexander Fleming, Puslinch, and the deceased in 1832 marched in the procession at Calder in honor of the passage of the Reformatory Bill. In 1852 his brother, the late Adam Robertson, sr., who came to Canada in 1834, went over to see his father, who was ailing, but by the time he reached the old home-stead his father had died. The property was disposed of, and John and his family came to Canada with his brother. He teamed for many years between Guelph and Hamilton, and was often entrusted with very large sums of money. After the railway was built he teamed for Mr. James Godie. Having a few cows on his place, he left teaming and went into the milk business, which he has carried on ever since. It may be mentioned that it is only about a year ago since Mr. and Mrs. Robertson celebrated their golden wedding. The family consists of the widow, seven sons and four daughters. The sons are Adam, Durham; John, Streetsville; James, Lockport, Ill.; George, Kalamazoo; and Seth, William, and Alexander at home. The daughters are May and Bessie, at home, and Mrs. A. Murhie, Guelph, and Mrs. Charles Leitch, Detroit. The deceased all his life was a staunch Reformer.

The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon, and was very largely attended by many friends and acquaintances. The services were conducted by Rev. Messrs. Martin and Strahan. The pallbearers were: Thos. Davidson, J. T. Brill, Chas. Thain, Geo. Torrance, Thos. Davis and James Johnston who were chosen by the deceased before his death.
