Marrying exclusively for wealth or position is a reproach, and is generally mentioned with a prediction that it will not turn out well. 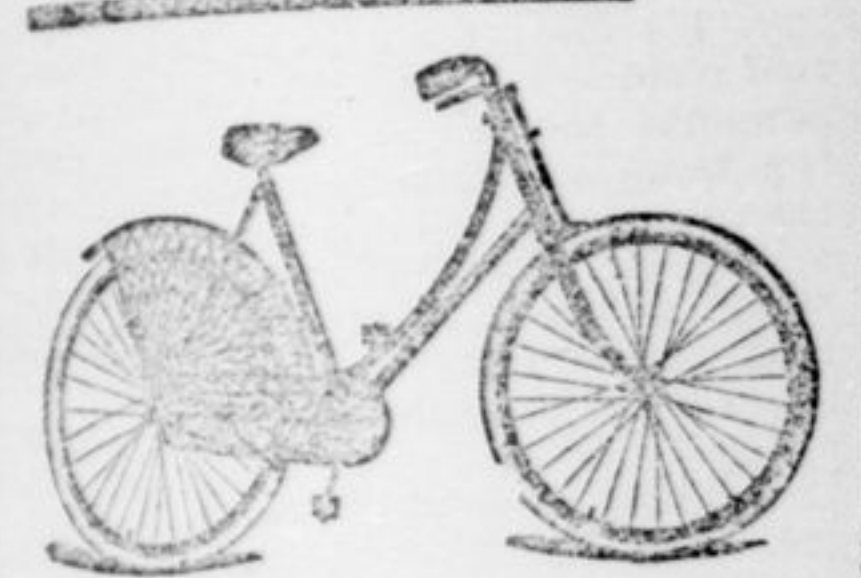

Town Council.

CEMENT FOUND AT DURHAM.

A short time ago four specimens of marl, Nos. 1 and 2 referred to in the letter below being taken from Wilder's Lake, and 3 and 4 from Mr. Geo. Hepkin's farm a little west of the town, were sent to the Bureau of Mines, Toronto, by Dr. Jamieson for examination, and from the following reply the matter may be worth looking into, as a paying industry in the production of Portland Cement may result.

(Office of the Bureau of Mines.)
30th March, 1898.

DEAR SIR:—The samples of marl forwarded by you were received this morning. Nos. 1 and 2 are mixed with a large proportion of peat and clay matter, and would have little value as material for the manufacture of Portland Cement. Nos 3 and 4 are of good quality, and if a large quantity is obtainable it will no doubt prove useful for cement making. No. 3 appears to contain less earthy material than No. 4.
