The subject of this sketch, Mr. Wm. Mead, who died on Tuesday, April 5th, in his seventy-seventh year, was born in Devonport, Devonshire in 1822. Receiving a fair education at the common school, he apprenticed at the age of thirteen or fourteen as a machinist, in his native town. At nineteen, he became acquainted with, and married Miss Maria Lavers, the result of the union being sixteen children, of whom ten still live to comfort their aged and infirm mother. Forty-one years ago the deceased, and family, emigrated to Canada, working for a couple of years at his trade in the Cochrane Foundry, then in full operation. Shortly afterwards he purchased and settled on Lot 5 con. 3 Egremont, where he lived until the time of his death. Richard, John, William and George of Ohio, Mrs. Alex. McTaminy, Massachusetts; Mrs. Robert Horton, Collingwood; Mrs. Wm. Linnel, Summerberry, N. W. T.; Mrs. L. Elvidge, Durham; Mrs. R. Webber, Bentinck; and Robert, on the homestead, still survive to mourn the loss of a kind father.

For more than twenty years, the deceased was an ardent, devoted member of the Baptist church, and an enthusiastic Christian worker. In politics, he was always Conservative, and with the exception of one vote, recorded for Mr. Wm. Allan, Conservative Patron, he never voted otherwise. The funeral took place on Thursday, on Thursday, the Rev. Mr. McGregor, his esteemed pastor, conducting the service. With the exception of William and George of Ohio, and Mrs. Linnel of Summerberry, his children were all present at the funeral obsequies. The deceased was a kind husband, an indulgent father, honest and upright in all his dealings and highly respected by all who knew him. The bereaved family have the heartfelt sympathy of the whole community.

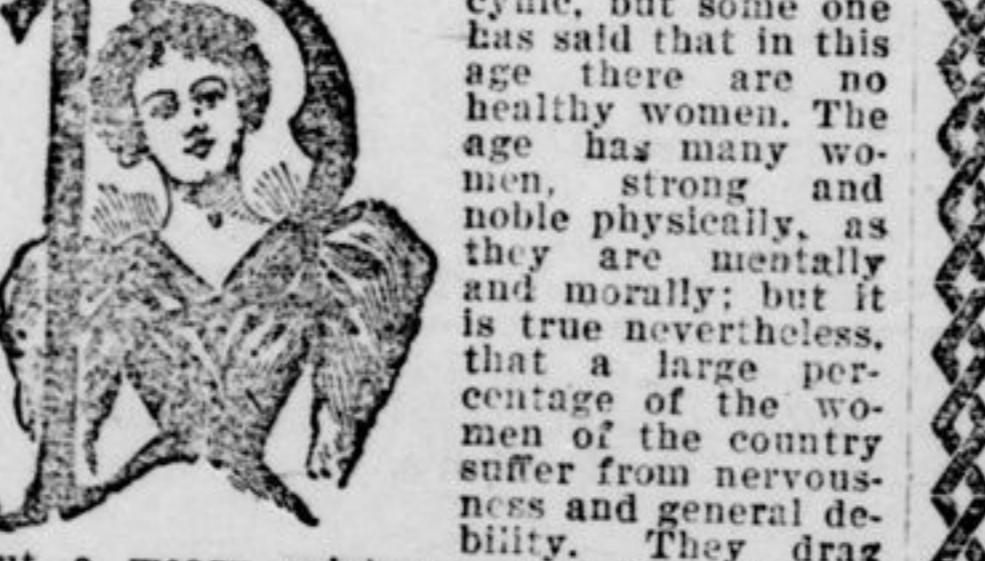
