The following quotation from "Current History," a quarterly magazine Toronto St. published in Boston, Mass.. shows the financial standing of Cuba:-"Until 1864 Cuba had no debt and yielded Spain an enormous yearly revenue. In 1861 Spain deliberately voted to issue \$3,000,000 to be charged to Cuba as her share of Spain's war expenses in foreign parts. In 1868 the debt to Spain had accumulated until it was \$7,630,000. This war is estimated to have cost Spain \$275,000,000, so that the present debt must be about \$443,500,000.
