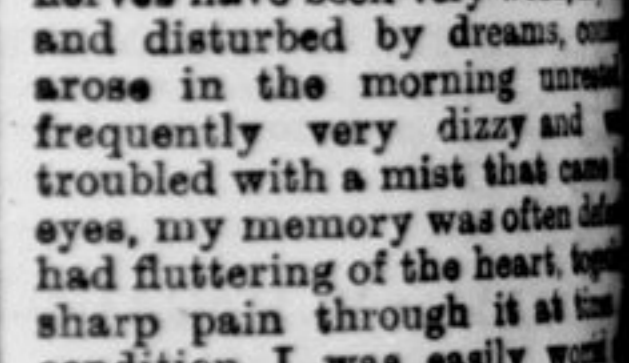

Beet Sugar Factory Sure. A \$500,000 Factory at Owen Sound.

John MacKenzie, Vice President and corresponding Director of the Owen Sound Sugar Manufacturing Co., has a positive offer from a Scotch syndicate of capitalists. The offer comes through a New York office of the large German Manufacturing Firm of Greneybroick, Germany, to build the Sugar Factory in Owen S'd.

Among the conditions required is a moderate Government Bounty on Beet Sugar for five years, and the technical parts of the machinery admitted free of duty. All other conditions asked, the Owen Sound Co. already have, such as Beet growing and good results of analysis, also lime stone, water and land and cheap freight rates for beets and coal and wood for fuel.

The Owen Sound Manufacturing Co., limited, was commenced about three years ago when the bounty offered was seventy-five cents on raw sugar, up to one dollar on refined granulated sugar.

The Company, who are principally farmers residing in North Grey, have gone to great expense and labor in getting charter, growing beets and having them tested for the past three years, which they would not have done, if the Bounty was to be taken off.—O. S. Advertiser.

Charcoal for Swine.

Hogs that are fattening will often eat charcoal quite greedily. That from corn on the cob is probably the best, as the cob contains a very considerable amount of potash, which corrects the acidity of the stomach. Corn is a very heavy and rich grain, and hard of digestion for any animal.

In the quantities that fattening hogs eat of corn it is no wonder if their stomachs are cloyed. A little charcoal will greatly improve their appetite. Even hogs that are not fattening will eat some charcoal. It has some nutrition and they are in no danger of eating too much.—Ex.

Wheat for pigs.

Wheat is now higher than it has been for many years and too dear to feed to grow animals of any kind. Yet we feel that small amounts fed daily to young and growing pigs will pay even at present prices. It will

probably pay to feed wheat to all pigs in part to replace the corn rations that are nearly always injurious. Wheat contains more nearly the elements of growth than any other grain except peas and beans, and only sheep can be induced to eat whole beans. Wheat bran and wheat middlings cost nearly as much as wheat and are not so good if given in moderation.—American Cultivator.
