**Fatal Runaway Accident.**

**Mrs. Q. Campbell Thrown from a Rig and Killed.—The Third Violent Death in the Family.**

We are called upon this week to chronicle under very sad circumstances the death of Mrs. Mary Campbell, relict of the late Quintin Campbell, of Con. 2, Bentinck. On Sunday morning last the deceased, who was seventy-two years of age, attended the Presbyterian church with her son-in-law, Mr. Thos. Milligan, Mrs. Milligan, two sons and one daughter, there being six in all in the vehicle. Mr. Milligan was driving and having a colt in the team, which became frightened at the sight of an umbrella raised by the deceased on the way to church and remained somewhat irritable from the effects of the scare. On the return trip all went well until reaching the second concession opposite the farm of Mr. John Lawrence when the colt became again excited by a boy jumping from the rig and another sight of the umbrella, and immediately plunged forward and ran down the hill. Mr. Milligan hung strenuously to the lines, Mrs. Milligan with her little daughter in her arms jumped from the rig and escaped, and all might still have come right but just as the foot of the hill was reached both lines snapped in two pitching Mr. Milligan forcibly to the ground into a soft mud hole. The soft ground saved him from more serious results. The horses were now free, the old lady and a fifteen year old son of Mr. Milligan's being the only occupants. Shortly Mrs. Campbell was pitched out on a pile of stones and the boy remained the sole occupant of the vehicle to which he hung till it was overturned at the owner's gate, when he caught the bridle and manfully held the horses till the arrival of additional help. Mrs. Campbell's apparently lifeless form lay prostrate on the road, and for some time no sign of life appeared. Dr. Park was hastily called but his efforts were in vain and death ensued about 4 o'clock Monday afternoon without a return to consciousness.

Had it not been for the unfortunate breaking of the lines no calamity would have occurred as Mr. Milligan had the horses well under control and a rise in the road was adding to his chances.

The family have had many sad misfortunes. Three years ago Mr. Campbell died from injuries received at a barn raising. Ten years ago a son, Thomas, was drowned in Toronto bay. About three weeks ago a daughter, Kate, died of consumption, and now this additional calamity befalls the bereaved survivors.

Mrs. Campbell was born in 1826 in Kirkcubrightshire, Scotland, was married in her native land to Mr. Quintin Campbell, emigrated to Toronto about '51 or '52 and for a time Mr. Campbell was engaged in making brick to be used in the construction of the Grand Trunk Railway. For the past thirty-five years or so they have resided in Bentinck, where they were much respected in life, and mourned in death. The deceased leaves two sons and two daughters: Matthew, who lives on the 2nd con. of Bentinck near the scene of the sad occurrence, John who is living in the Assiniboia District, Mrs. Thos. Milligan and Mrs. Thos. Torry both living in Bentinck.

The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock being followed to the Durham Cemetery by a large concourse of sympathizing friends and mourning relatives. The bereaved families have the sincere sympathy of a large circle of acquaintances in this additional calamity.
