SUTCH CASSIDY AND HIS FIVE
HUNDRED OUTLAWS.

Hundreds of Miles of Territory at Their
Merry—They Are the Terrors of Four
Western American States.

The Governors of Colorado, Utah, Wy-
oming, and Idaho, recently met in con-
ference to devise means for executing
the notorious Butch Cassidy and his
gang, who for years have rendered life
and property unsafe in certain sections
of the United States.
