County Council.

(Condensed from the Meaford Mirror.)

In accordance with the resolution passed at the January session, the County Council met in the Town Hall, Meaford, on Monday evening, 14th inst., M. Richardson, Warden, in the chair.

On calling the Council to order the Warden very briefly addressed it. He suggested that though they were not meeting in the old Court House in the County Town, that nevertheless they might have a very comfortable and useful meeting in Meaford. He also referred to the bright prospects for an abundant harvest.

Mayor Hamill, of Meaford, came forward and read an address of welcome to the County Council, to which the Warden briefly replied.

The roll was called by the Clerk, when all members answered to their names. Minutes of last day of Jan'y session were read and confirmed.

The Warden read a number of documents among which were the following: the County Treasurer's estimate, showing amount required for year, \$35,206; application from Col. Telford, of the 31st Battalion, asking customary grant to supplement the pay of the men while in camp this summer; a memorial from the County Council of Lanark to the Legislature asking that the term of the committal of indigents to gaol be extended so that they need not be brought forward for recomittal so frequently as the law now requires, also that constables' fees for work in connection with committal of vagrants be reduced; report of the Children's Aid Society of the county covering their work since November last; letter from the Board of Education of Owen Sound, referring to the vacancy on the Board caused by the death of Mr. George Inglis, and asking that the vacancy be filled; the annual report of Thos. Gordon, Public School Inspector for West Grey; report of South Grey Farmers' Institute; communication from Township of Artemesia through Reeve Christie asking that the Council take steps to have the townline between Euphrasia and Artemesia improved; application from the Board of the General and Marine Hospital to have a director appointed by the County Council to represent the county on the Board; statement of Government appointment to public schools.

In order to allow the Town Council to meet the Co. Council adjourned till Tuesday.

TUESDAY MORNING. Council met at 10 o'clock. A number of accounts were referred to the Standing Committees.

The following reports and communications were read: report of North Grey Farmers' Institute; Ed. Fitzgerald application for free pedlar's license; County of Grey Poultry Association asking for usual grant of \$50.

The Public School Inspector for S. Grey presented his 11th annual report. It stated that the school houses and equipments of the district are on the whole satisfactory. Several new sections have been opened by arbitration, all of which are doing good work. A number of accounts were presented and referred to the several standing committees.

The special committee to which was referred the address of the Meaford Town Council presented its report and reply, which were read by Mr. John McDonald and adopted.

Mr. Binnie in moving the adoption said he desired to add a few words to the report by way of emphasizing the pleasure he felt at meeting at Meaford for the first time to transact the county business. He believed that the County Council would derive much useful information by holding their meetings at different places in the county. Mr. Binnie, in closing, said that no portion of the county was so well adapted for fruit-growing as Meaford, and he anticipated that their visit would prove a source of pleasure and profit to all.

The Council agreed to accept the invitation of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Cleland to spend the evening at their residence, and adjourned.

WEDNESDAY MORNING. Council met at 10 o'clock. All present. Minutes read and adopted.

The following were read and referred to the respective committees: ac't from A. Suter, \$1.50, advertising meeting in Meaford; letter from N. W. Campbell re fees of outside Entrance candidates; annual report of A. Grier, P. S. I, East Grey; application of Mrs. Galbraith for refund of amount paid by her late husband for an auctioneer's license.

Some reports of com's were received and adopted. Report No. 1 of Finance Committee, presented by Mr. Binnie, dealt with the following matters, and made with the following recommendations in each case as follows: T. E. Meir, rubber stamp for auditors, 58c.; Co. Clerk's postage ac't, \$7.50; R. Cockenridge & Son,

funeral expenses of A. Sheffield, an indigent, \$7.50. It recommended the granting of a renewal of the free pedlar's license to Edward Fitzgerald, a cripple; that the reports of North and South Grey Farmers' Institutes be filed; also that the circular from the Crown Lands Department re survey Act amendment be filed; it also dealt with the equalization of the County assessment for 1899, placing the equalized assessment of the various municipalities as follows:

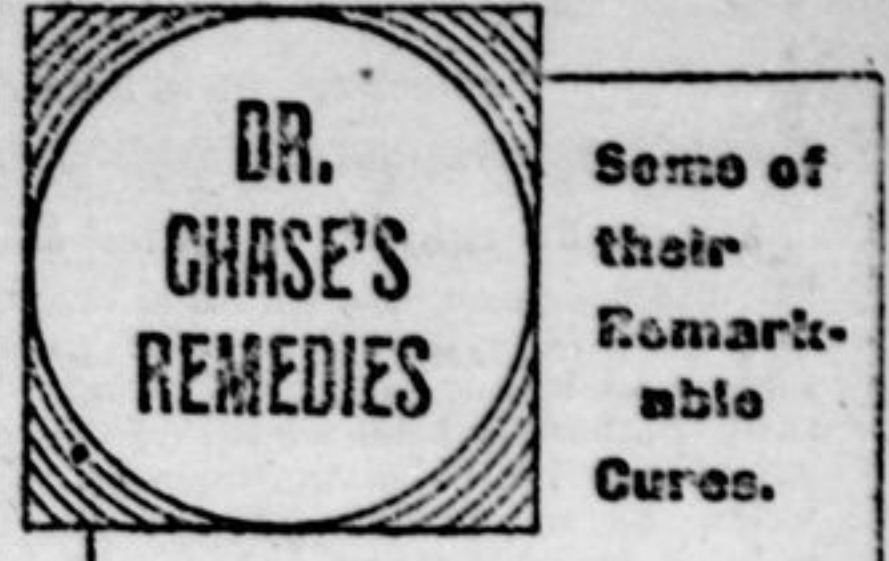
