COUNTY COUNCIL.

grant of \$75 was made to the Children's Aid Society, of Owen Sound and County of Grey; the applications of Col. Telford for a grant to the 31st Battalion, and of the Poultry and Pet Stock Association, of Owen Sound were refused; Grants of \$25 each were recommended to the Farmers' Institutes of each riding, and of \$25 each to the Teachers' Institutes of South, West and East Grey.

The report of the Special Committee re gaol supplies, dealt fully with the subject. The committee had evidently gone very fully into the matter, getting the opinion of the Gaol Inspectors, as well as information from a number of the counties in this part of Ontario. Clause 1 dealt with the question of wherein lay the authority to make purchases of gaol supplies; clause 2—with the articles which may be advantageously purchased by tender; clause 3—recommended that supplies be advertised for by the County Clerk instead of by the Clerk of the Peace, as formerly; clause 4—recommends that the tenders be submitted to and awarded by a committee composed of the Warden, the Sheriff and the County Clerk and that the Clerk report the result to the County Council. Clause 5 recommends that the fuel and ice supply, and the making of repairs and improvements to the county buildings and grounds be left in the hands of the County Property Committee. Clause 6—that the procuring of medical supplies shall be on the order of the gaol surgeon. The remainder of the Report explained how the Criminal Justice and Judicial accounts of the County are audited, and recommended the appointment of a standing committee on criminal justice accounts, its report to be referred to the Council, so that the Council may be made fully acquainted with the expenditures in detail, and so get information with which they have not heretofore been furnished. This report was full of interest to the Council and was, without doubt, one of the most interesting yet presented, reflecting the highest credit on the ability of the committee, and particularly upon the chairman, Mr. McDonald. On motion Council adjourned.

EGREMONT COUNCIL.

A special meeting of Council was held in the forenoon of June 13th, to consider ways and means of raising the necessary funds to meet our railway debentures, falling due August 1st, 1898. Mr. McInnes absent.

Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted.

McQueen—Hunter—That the form of petition drafted by the Clerk respecting the railway debt, together with the form of debentures and by-law appended thereto be adopted and handed over to the delegates to be appointed for consent and approval of His Honor, the Lieutenant Governor in Council.—Carried.

Hunter—McQueen—That the Reeve and treasurer be appointed delegates to present the petition to the Lieutenant Governor in Council asking leave to issue debentures for the sum of \$9000 to meet liabilities on Railway By-Law due August 1st '98.—Carried.

McQueen—Hunter—That the Clerk notify all parties indebted to this municipality by way of mortgage that such accounts must be paid by July 15th, 1898.—Carried.

Council adjourned until Monday, June 27th as per motion from last regular session.
