**The Cuban Sufferers.**

An American lady, residing in Guatanamo, Cuba, has written a letter to the Oneida Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, speaking of some of the mis-directed charities and stating that among the starving people three things seemed to be essential—condensed milk, quinine pills, and Scott's Emulsion of Cod Liver Oil.

**From Niagara Camp.**

Received too late for last week. As it was the wish of the CHRONICLE staff to receive an account of the trip to Niagara, we will now endeavor to give a few of the events in as brief a space as possible.

When No. 4 struck Toronto it was noon, and a raid was made on the restaurants, and God knows where they didn't go. At 1:30 the 31st Batt., together with the 34th, boarded the fine steamer, Chippewa. The weather was excellent, and the trip by boat discounted the land by 14 growlers. A host of Americans were

The sun has the boys' faces frizzled so that they are almost beyond recognition, and the comparisons are made accordingly. Whelan is the fac-simile of the boiled end of a Tamworth hog. This is no lie, for it is universal, and sanctioned by the sergeant. There are a few in the hospital, and one man got his leg broken playing base-ball. The 1st go to the Falls to-morrow. Yesterday, Sunday, some went to the Falls, some to Queenston, and others to Youngston. All quiet along the Niagara to-night.
