If hogs have plenty of grass in summer and about half the corn they will eat, they will fatten rapidly, and my belief is that three pounds can be made on less grain than one pound in cold weather with a hog in a close pen. The grass is cooling and loosening and counteracts the feverish properties of the corn. Hogs will never melt in summer. however fat, if they can have access to water and mud to lie in. Mud is English currency.
