EGREMONT COUNCIL.

Council met June 27th. Walter Hastie took his seat as Councillor. Minutes of previous meeting approved. Hunter—McInnes—That the clerk notify two engineers to attend to P. Murch's case before July 12th. Carried. McInnes—McQueen—That W. Fettes Jr. be appointed Pathmaster in Division 5. Con. 13 and 14. Carried. Councillor McQueen reported that he let townline near Cedarville, to Archie McEachern for \$1.25 Egrement's share 70c. Work completed. Payment received. Hunter—Hastie—That foregoing report be adopted, order granted. Carried. Hastie—Hunter—That Jas. Laughton be paid \$2 balance on culvert for 1897. Carried. McInnes—Hastie—That the following persons be exempt from statute labor, viz: Jno. Coss, Geo. Clever, Miss Spencer and Mrs. Amos. Carried. McQueen—Hastie—That the account of the late Dr. Brown be not entertained and administrator to that effect. Carried. On report of Mr. Hunter \$9.90. to \$8. on sideroad No. 10. Carried. Hastie—McQueen—That foregoing report be adopted and order granted. Carried. A resolution assigning limits of each road commissioner was fixed by the Council. McQueen—Hunter—That the Reeve be authorized to meet the Reeve of Normanby Swamp, date of meeting to be appointed by next meeting of council, and to report at next meeting of council. Carried. Messrs W. Fettes and J. Calder solicited aid to improve the road at Lots 22-23, Con. 14. Hunter—Hastie—That the council be instructed to repair said road as soon as possible. Carried. Messrs. Harris and Dyce waited on the Council re repairing Egrement town line. McQueen—McInnes—That Deputy-Reeve Hunter communicate with Egrement Council and have the town line repaired between Concessions 10-11 Egrement and Egrement. Carried. Frank McCullough addressed the Council re culvert Egrement and Arthur town line. Hunter—Hastie—That Con. McQueen examine said locality and report at the next session. Carried. Messrs. McKechnie, Milne, Dundas, Switzer, McDougall and others solicited aid towards road improvements. McInnes—McQueen—That the several road Commissioners attend to the repairs necessary in each case. Carried. Hunter—McInnes—That Jas. Crawford be paid \$6.25 for one road scraper. Carried. McInnes—Hastie—That Mr. McQueen examine the bridge at Lot 18 con 5-6 and report at next session. Carried. A communication from the Lieut-Governor states that he had no power to grant the petition submitted to him. McInnes—McQueen—That the Treasurer and Reeve enter into correspondence with the Guelf and Ontario Loan and Insurance Society re purchasing some of our Railway Debentures, and report at the next meeting. Carried. By-Law No 103 to provide for and obtain gravel and other material for repairing and constructing roads, passed the usual readings, wrs signed, sealed and ordered to be engrossed on the By-Law Book. Carried. Councillor McQueen reported that the bridge on the 5th and 6th concessions known as Drewry's, is in a very dangerous state, and recommended immediate action to have it repaired. The Reeve was instructed to get Legal advice re Mrs. McMillan's Estate. I. B. Lucas was paid \$5.00 for Leg. I services re McCormick deviation. Other payments were made as follows: John McKechnie, flour for James Dillon, \$2.50; Isaac Traynor, surveys \$12.00; John McKinnon, half cost of repairing Bridge at Lot 16. Con. 1. E. G. R. \$4.00; James Staples, committee work, \$7.00; John Williams, committee work, \$5.00; J. S. Black, services re McCormack deviation, \$2; John McMillan, committee work, \$1. The Clerk on salary, \$30. By-Law No. 5th, authorizing the Treasurer to borrow \$20 for current expenses was passed, and the council adjourned to August 15th. at 10. a. m. J. S. BLACK, Clerk.
