But the proposed attack upon England's possessions in the East never amounted to more than a proposition. With the utmost haste Nelson, with a powerful fleet, was dispatched to the rescue, and with an instinctive perception of the proper point of attack, he saw that India was to be saved, not by sending ships around the Cape, but by defeating the French in the Mediterranean. was as conclusive as the battle of Trafalgar, for of the unlucky 13 vessels of the French fleet nine were taken, two burned and but two escaped. The movement toward the East was instantly stopped, the remnant of the French army left in Egypt was defeated and surrendered. Napoleon escaped by stealth and in disguise, and every Englishman drew a long breath of relief, for India was safe.
