THE CROP THAT NEVER FAILS

High School Entrance & Public School Leaving Examinations.

The following is a list of the successful candidates at the Entrance and Public School Leaving Examinations held in South Grey. In the whole county 418 candidates presented themselves for examination.

To secure a pass on the Entrance 550 marks were required, besides one third of the marks on each subject. In the Leaving, the total required to pass varied according as the candidates presented Drawing and Book-keeping books; hence, there is not the same uniformity as in the Entrance Examination.

In the case of recommended candidates, all who are passed by the Education Department will be awarded certificates, as the others. Recommendations are made when a candidate has passed on the total, but has failed on one subject.
