**PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN** that pursuant to the By-Law on that behalf, the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Durham, purposes to proceed with the Construction of

**GRANOLITHIC SIDEWALKS,**  
According to petitions presented by property holders on the following streets, viz.:

**PETITION NO. 2.**  
Beginning at the North side of Gordon's Jewellery shop on the West side of Garafraxa street and extending South a width of 8 feet to Lambton street, then to cross Lambton street a width of 4 feet. The total length of said walk is 1043 feet.

**PETITION NO. 3.**  
Beginning at the Northern limits of the Corporation of the Town of Durham, on the West side of Garafraxa street, and extending South along said Garafraxa street a width of 6 feet, then to cross John street a width of 3 feet, then South to Jackson street, 6 feet wide and across it a width of 3 feet, thence to Hunter street same width of 6 feet, and crossing it take a width of 3 feet, thence to Durham Road at the same width and same width of crossing. Thence to Chester street, same width and same crossing; thence to George street with same width and same crossing. The total length of said walk is 2628 feet.
