SOUTH GREY FALL FAIR.

To Be Held in Durham on Tuesday and Wednesday, September 27 and 28, 1898.

Messrs. Pagsley, Dingman & Co., of Toronto, the well known manufacturers of Comfort Soap, have very generously granted the managers of the Fair the following prizes to be awarded the winners of the foot race known as, "The Ladies' Comfort Soap Race":
